

Archbishop Sherrington: Contact your MP to oppose abortion amendments to Crime and Policing Bill:

The Lead Bishop for Life Issues for the Bishops' Conference, Archbishop John Sherrington, is asking Catholics to **contact their MPs** to encourage them to oppose two amendments on abortion in the Crime and Policing Bill: "We are deeply alarmed by two amendments that have been submitted to the Crime and Policing Bill. These would further reduce the protection of unbom children and their mothers. Out of compassion for pregnant women and their babies, the Catholic Church believes that the law should offer protection to the unborn and that society should offer support for parents who need it. The proposed amendments would take our law further in the wrong direction.



"Under New Clause 1, the criminal law would no longer apply in relation to women acting to end their pregnancy, at any time, including up to and during birth. This is likely to result in an increased illegal use of abortion pills and an escalation in late-term athome abortions, putting the lives and health of many pregnant women and their babies in grave danger. It would undermine the necessary judicial mechanisms to protect women from being coerced or pressurized into an abortion.

"New Clause 20 would decriminalise abortion completely up to and during birth. This would leave women with little protection against forced or coerced abortions by families and third parties. Abortion would become available on demand and up to birth. There is little support amongst the general public for such an extreme law which entirely overturns the existing framework and totally disregards the humanity of the unborn baby.

"Keeping abortion within the criminal law provides some level of protection for women and unborn children. Of course, where cases do arise under the current law, the authorities should act with both justice and mercy.

"Pregnant women and their unborn babies both have inherent dignity, and as such, mothers need to be supported in welcoming new life. Several Catholic organisations work tirelessly to provide support for parents and children. This is the truly safe, compassionate, and caring response to parents who are expecting a baby. I thank them for their work.

"I encourage all faithful Catholics, and those who care for the lives of children and mothers, to contact their MPs and encourage them to oppose these amendments." Archbishop John Sherrington, Lead Bishop for Life Issues and Archbishop of Liverpool

Bishop Hudson says peacebuilding is a vital aspect of international security: Earlier this month the government announced the review, with wide-ranging measures, including building 12 attack submarines and a commitment to raise defence spending to 2.5% by 2027-28 with the aim of 3% by the next parliament. Bishop Hudson added: "It is important to ensure that the expansion of military funding does not result in the diversion of resources away from foreign aid and support for the world's poorest people. Without a balanced investment in diplomacy, multilateralism, and assistance to the poor as vital means of securing peace, we risk deepening the very crises we seek to prevent." I also hope that the UK approaches the development of autonomous weapon systems with great caution, always upholding the principle that machines must never replace human moral judgment or responsibility in matters of life and death." I urge our government leaders to remember that true security comes not only from strength, but also from compassion and active peacebuilding."

HOMILY FOR THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

- 1. The revelation of the Trinity is one of the greatest proofs of God's love for us. We do not reveal ourselves to those we do not love. And we reveal ourselves in proportion to our love. In revealing the Trinity, God revealed his very nature, his most intimate life. And he did this gradually and progressively according to our capacity and need. The Trinity is the origin of our lives. It is true that creation is attributed to the Father, redemption to the Son and sanctification to the Holy Spirit.
- 2. The Trinity is the model for our lives. We are made in the "image of God," in the image of the Trinity. By contemplating the Trinity, we can learn a lot about ourselves and about the way we should live. The Trinity is a COMMUNITY OF PERSONS. There are no isolated, self-sufficient, rugged individuals. There are three equal Persons living together in community. Each Person needs the other two Persons to be God. We need each other to be truly human. We are social beings. We are mutually interdependent. This is evident in the beginning of life and at the end of life. The newborn infant left to itself dies and the very old person left to himself dies. And in between the entrance and the exit we are still dependent one on another. It is through these relationships that we identify ourselves and become the person God has given us the potential to become.
- 3. This community of persons is a COMMUNITY OF LOVE. The essence of the Trinity is a personal relationship of love between the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Love should also be characteristic of the Christian community. We are rooted and grounded in love. We all have a need to love and be loved. Love is creative, fulfilling and healing. It heals both the one who gives it and the one who receives it.
- 4. In the Trinity there is not uniformity but UNITY in DIVERSITY. Each Person is unique and all share in the divine nature in perfect unity. Each one of us is unique but we share a common origin, common nature and a common destiny. The Christian community begins with the acceptance of this unity in diversity. It is this diversity that gives glory to God. Unfortunately for us, diversity is a source of fear, suspicion and hatred. How devastating to the community is the unreasonable demand for uniformity. What a dull, boring world it would be if everyone were alike. Suppose we put together a group of like-minded persons who share common values, a common socio-economic status, a common ethnic background, a common intelligence quotient and other human factors thinking these similarities would ensure peace; but it won't. Income and social status do not matter. Cultural background and ethnicity do not matter. What part of the world you came from does not matter. In Christ there is a unity because of and despite the diversity. What unites us is Jesus and the faith that was revealed by him to his apostles. It doesn't mean that we have to get along all the time. Nor does it mean we have to particularly like each other. It means that we are a community of broken people that God has raised up in the resurrection of his Son. The word catholic means unity in diversity.
- 5. The Trinity is the destiny of our lives. It gives us something to look forward to. "God is love." (1 John 4:16) Love is my origin, my mission and my destiny. It doesn't matter who you are, where you live, what is your state in life, what is your job, what is the multitude or magnitude of the deeds you do what matters, and without which nothing else matters, is that you love. Love is the criterion of Jesus, "This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13: 35) "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you so you also should love one another." (John 13: 34) Your love tells how good a Christian you are. This is how the first Christians were identified, "See how they love one another." (Tertullian)

Eternal God, eternal Trinity, you have made the blood of Christ so precious through his sharing in your divine nature. You are a mystery as deep as the sea; the more I search, the more I find, and the more I find the more I search for you. But I can never be satisfied; what I receive will ever leave me desiring more. When you fill my soul, I have an even greater hunger, and I grow more famished for your light. I desire above all to see you, the true light, as you really are.

<u>I have tasted and seen</u> the depth of your mystery and the beauty of your creation with the light of my understanding. I have clothed myself with your likeness and have seen what I shall be. Eternal Father, you have given me a share in your power and the wisdom that Christ claims as his own, and your Holy Spirit has given me the desire to love you. You are my Creator, eternal Trinity, and I am your creature. You have made of me a new creation in the blood of your Son, and I know that you are moved with love at the beauty of your creation, for you have enlightened me.

Eternal Trinity. Godhead, mystery deep as the sea, you could give me no greater gift than the gift of yourself. For you are a fire ever burning and never consumed, which itself consumes all the selfish love that fills my being. Yes, you are a fire that takes away the coldness, illuminates the mind with its light and causes me to know your truth.
