PARABLE OF THE PHARISEE AND THE PUBLICAN

(Luke 18, 9-14)

Two Men, Two Prayers, Two Attitudes, Two Verdicts.

God's righteousness versus
Man's Righteousness

<u>Today's Gospel Reading</u> tells us the story of two men who went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, thanked God he wasn't like some other people and then made a list of his many virtues. The tax collector, standing at the back, didn't even feel worthy enough to raise his eyes to God but kept beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" Jesus says, "I tell you, this man went back home justified rather than the other."

<u>The first reading</u> highlights how God hears the prayer of the humble, "The man who with his whole heart serves God will be accepted, his petitions will carry to the clouds. The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds ... and the Lord will not be slow".

In the second reading, Paul begins with what seems to be a boast, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." This wasn't boasting. Paul was simply stating the direction his life took after meeting the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus. Paul also knew that it wasn't his own strength that enabled him to follow Jesus. Rather, as he acknowledges at the end of the 2nd reading, "The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom.

<u>Today</u> we come to this table to celebrate God's role in our lives. At the beginning of Mass each week we say, "Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy". We acknowledge God's Merciful Love in our lives once again, and we experience the strength that comes from him. What word or phrase from the readings will you carry with you this week? May it be "God will take your petitions to the clouds. The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds", or "I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from all evil attempts on me and bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom." Or "God, be merciful to me, a sinner".

On Thursday, October 23, Pope Leo XIV participated in various events with King Charles III and Queen Camilla, including an ecumenical prayer in the Sistine Chapel, marking a historic moment in Anglican-Catholic relations. This visit marked a historic moment in Anglican-Catholic relations – one that has not occurred in 500 years. Two themes marked the journey: Christian unity and care for the environment.

First reading: Sirach 35:15b-17, 20-22b

The Lord is the judge, and with him is no partiality. He will not show partiality in the case of a poor man; and he will listen to the prayer of one who is wronged. He will not ignore the supplication of the orphan or the widow when she pours out her story. He whose service is pleasing to the Lord will be accepted, and his prayer will reach to the clouds. The prayer of the humble pierces the clouds, and he will not be consoled until it reaches the Lord; he will not desist until the Most High visits him and does justice for the righteous and executes judgement. Second reading: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

Beloved: I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but also to all who have loved his appearing.

At my first defence no one came to stand by me, but all deserted me. May it not be charged against them! But the Lord stood by me and strengthened me, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil deed and bring me safely into his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia. Alleluia. God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Alleluia.

Gospel: Luke 18:9-14

At that time: Jesus told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and treated others with contempt: 'Two men went up into the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: "God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I get." But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" I tell you, this man went down to his house justified, rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted.'
